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Ball Releases Audit of Rockcastle County Sheriff's Tax Settlement

FRANKFORT, Ky. – State Auditor Allison Ball today released the audit of the sheriff's settlement – 2022 taxes for Rockcastle County Sheriff Shannon Franklin. State law requires the auditor to annually audit the accounts of each county sheriff. In compliance with this law, the auditor issues two sheriff's reports each year: one reporting on the audit of the sheriff's tax account, and the other reporting on the audit of the fee account used to operate the office.

Auditing standards require the auditor's letter to communicate whether the sheriff's settlement presents fairly the taxes charged, credited and paid in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. The sheriff's settlement is prepared on the regulatory basis, which is described in the auditor's opinion letter. Regulatory basis reporting for the sheriff's settlement is an acceptable reporting methodology, and this reporting methodology is followed for all 120 sheriff settlements in Kentucky.

The sheriff's financial statement fairly presents the taxes charged, credited and paid for the period September 1, 2022 through August 31, 2023 in conformity with the regulatory basis of accounting.

As part of the audit process, the auditor must comment on noncompliance with laws, regulations, contracts, and grants. The auditor must also comment on material weaknesses involving the internal control over financial operations and reporting.

The audit contains the following finding:

The Rockcastle County Sheriff's Office does not have adequate segregation of duties: The Rockcastle County Sheriff's office does not have adequate segregation of duties over receipts and disbursements. The sheriff has two bookkeepers. One bookkeeper is responsible for opening mail and writing checks. The second bookkeeper, who is part-time, is responsible for posting receipts and disbursements to the ledgers as well as preparing the bank reconciliation. Both bookkeepers collect receipts, prepare bank deposits, prepare the daily tax report, and can initiate voided transactions in the computerized tax system.

According to the sheriff's office, this condition is a result of a limited budget, which restricts the number of employees the sheriff can hire or delegate duties to.

We recommend the sheriff ensure that accounting duties are properly segregated in the future. If this is not feasible, the sheriff should implement adequate compensating controls that would limit the severity of this deficiency in internal controls. Additionally, evidence of the compensating controls implemented should be maintained.

Sheriff's Response: The official did not provide a response.

The sheriff's responsibilities include collecting property taxes, providing law enforcement, and performing services for the county fiscal court and courts of justice. The sheriff's office is funded through statutory commissions and fees collected in conjunction with these duties.
